### The verb être (to be)

The verb être (to be) is a key verb in French. It is irregular and does not follow a set pattern, so you need to learn it by heart.

être - to be	
je suis	I am
tu es	you are
il/elle est	he/she is
nous sommes	we are
vous êtes	you (plural) are
ils/elles sont	they are

## Week 3 and 4 Grammar

### Adjectival agreement and position

Most adjectives in French come after the noun that they describe. For example:

Un chien brun - A dog brown (a brown dog)

Adjective endings match whether the noun that they are describing is **masculine**, **feminine**, singular or plural.

Masculine singular	Masculine plural	Feminine singular	Feminine plural
amusant	amusants	amusante	amusantes
généreux	généreux	généreuse	généreuses
sportif	sportifs	sportive	sportives
gentil	gentils	gentille	gentilles

## Week 5 and 6 Grammar

### Possessive determiners

Possessive determiners tell us who a noun belongs to. In English they look like: my/your/his/her/ours/their.

In French they change depending on if the noun that they are describing is masculine, feminine, singular or plural.
